This toolkit was developed in response to the direct needs of communities in Wisconsin. Rural communities have been, and continue to be, affected by the opioid epidemic. Evidence shows that harm reduction strategies can have an impact on reducing the number of lives lost to overdose.

Harm Reduction Saves Lives aims to educate the general public on what harm reduction is and what resources are available in their community.

# Implementation Tips

- **Go Slow.** Harm reduction can be a touchy subject, especially in rural communities. It may take time to get people on board with accepting harm reduction.
- Find a **Champion**. Not only can these people help promote your campaign, but there are also a few places throughout the toolkit for you to add quotes from community members.
- **Be Responsive to Your Community.** Every community is at a different place when it comes to accepting the idea of harm reduction. Get to know where your community is at and meet them where they are. Perhaps they are only ready for a few social media posts right now, but in six months they may be ready to get their first naloxone box.

#### Use of Campaign Materials:

Materials were created and are owned by Marshfield Clinic Health System (MCHS). Materials should be used with integrity. Should coalitions wish to use materials outside of its original purpose, they must first consult with MCHS to receive approval prior to utilization. Coalitions will have the opportunity to add a logo to campaign materials for branding purposes.


## Social Media


#### 5. Addiction

*Note:* This post requires inserting a quote from someone in recovery. Find someone in your community to be this champion. If you don't have a quote, do not include the second graphic when posting.


6. Harm Reduction in Our Community

#### Harm Reduction Resource Guide



Intended Use: To educate the community on what harm reduction is including a few basic harm reduction strategies. This guide also provides space to advertise what harm reduction services are available in a specific community.

*Note:* This document is primarily intended to keep in an electronic format. Resource guides can quickly go out of date so keeping it electronic, helps make sure the most up to date version is always available to the community. A great location to house this resource would be on your agency's website.

#### Naloxone Here Poster

*Intended Use:* To post on the front door of a building with a naloxone box inside. This poster makes it easy for those entering a building to know exactly where overdose emergency supplies are located.

*Note*: This poster does require an agency to input custom information before printing and posting.
